THE SEWARD FAMILY'S CIVIL WAR

Course Description:

A hands-on introduction to the history of the family, gender, and the antebellum and Civil War eras, to historical editing, and to digital textual encoding, using the Papers of William Henry Seward (1801-1872), Governor of New York, US Senator, and Secretary of State under Abraham Lincoln during the Civil War. The Rush Rhees Rare Books, Special Collections, and Preservation Department holds the collection, which contains Seward's public and private correspondence, and that of family members, including his wife and children, as well as their extended family, neighbors, friends, and far-flung correspondents. The course will include reading on the Civil War era and the family, and instruction on documentary editing, transcription, and annotating historical manuscripts. This course is a pre-requisite for HIS 275/475 (The Seward Family in Peace and War), paid internships working on the Seward editorial project and at the Seward House Museum in Auburn, and a requirement for a graduate student research field in historical editing or the history of the family.

Evaluation:

- 25% attendance, preparation, and participation in discussions of assigned reading. [2% of course grade deducted for each absence.] 4 unexcused absences will result in a failing grade for the course.
- 50% productivity and accuracy in transcriptions and annotations of manuscripts. Students are responsible for transcribing and annotating approximately 25-30 pages of manuscript letters on the schedule included in the syllabus, and for the TEI markup of those letters. The final revisions of all transcriptions and annotations must be submitted not later than before class on December 2.
- 25% a 10-12 page capstone paper based on letter transcriptions. The capstone paper will be based on a research project within the Seward Papers that the student and Professor Slaughter agree upon during the second week of the semester. Each student must have a one-page project proposal before class on October 7, which we are glad to help you with; the proposal may be a transcription and annotation project; a finding aid for one part of the collection; or a research paper on the relationship between two or more members of the family. The capstone project is due on December 16.


